

Japan Festival Boston

How long have you been working in Boston? I moved to Boston in July 2021. I first visited Boston in high school, traveling with my family to visit relatives. I remember being impressed by the beautiful campuses of Belmont High School and Harvard University and being surprised by the size of the lobsters. In 2019, I revisited Boston as a Ministry of Foreign Affairs diplomat. I have now built strong bonds with many friends and the local community, and I feel that Boston is my "second home."



What do you do?

As a scholar specializing in global environmental issues, I am researching at Harvard University and the Research Institute for Humanity and Nature (RIHN), a national research institute in Kyoto. RIHN is based on the principle that "human culture—beliefs, values, and actions—are at the root of contemporary global environmental problems. "It is working to solve global-scale issues by bringing together experts from various fields while building on a natural science database....

Since 2023, I have been the President of the 501(c)(3) non-profit organization Boston Japan Community Hub Inc. As part of this volunteer work, we host the Japan Festival Boston. The festival has three basic principles: to express our gratitude to Boston, to provide an authentic experience of Japanese culture, and to create an opportunity for the community to come together through the event and the preparation process.

2025 MASSACHUSETTS HOKKAIDO DESIGN CONTEST


Deadline: 11:59PM ET, March 15, 2025


Join us to discuss some of the greatest classics of medieval Japanese literature, written by women authors!

A classic and complex Japanese author, readers may benefit from looking into the story of Mishima's life and the previous novel, since we have begun that discussion, but it is not necessary to sign up for this meeting.

Runaway Horses continues the story of Shigekuni Honda and weaves a chronicle of conspiracy, telling a story about the roots and nature of Japanese fanaticism in the years that led to war. As always Mishima's works are deeply reflective of his own life, in this case, his passion for the age of samurai and emperor in Japan.




JSB Meets JET Alumni

New Work by Yoshinori Hagiwara

Back to the Center New work by Yoshinori Hagiwara On display March 1st through May 4th, 2025 Pucker Gallery

Yoshinori Hagiwara is the fifth generation of the Hagiwara family ceramic workshop, currently residing in Mashiko, Japan. To obtain formal training, he studied and researched at the Tochigi Prefectural Ceramics Instructional Institute. Yoshinori's work has since been selected for inclusion, and has won numerous prizes at the National Art Exhibition for multiple years. The most recent ceramics have broadened beyond his well-known persimmon glaze, and he has incorporated yellow kaki, blue nuka, and namijiro glaze into his artistic vocabulary. Creating his own expression through these glazes, he exhibits great control in creating elegant forms. In 2014, Japan's Ministry of Economy, Trade, and Industry designated Hagiwara as a "Traditional Craftsman." His ceramics are included in significant public collections

including the Art Institute of Chicago, the Schein Joseph Museum of Ceramic Art at Alfred University in Alfred, New York, and the Tikotin Museum of Art in Haifa, Israel.

Introduction by Peter Grilli, JSB President Emeritus

Among the newest additions to the Shochiku Centennial Collection is a stunning new 35mm print, created at Imagica—the renowned photochemical lab in Osaka, Japan—of *Harakiri*, one of several masterworks directed by firebrand director Kobayashi Masaki (1916-1996) during the 1960s.

Nakadai Tatsuya sets into motion the slow-burning narrative of Kobayashi's powerful *jidaigeki* epic as a wraith-like *ronin* who appears at the compound of the local ruling samurai clan with an unusual request: to commit *seppuku*, assisted ritualized suicide, in order to end his drifting life....



Kengo Kuma, Return to Nature Tuesday, April 8th, 2025 - 6:30 PM EDT Harvard University Graduate School of Design

Architecture must bridge the gap between human life and the natural environment, an ethos deeply ingrained in Kengo Kuma's philosophy. Kuma prioritizes harmony with surroundings, using materials like wood and stone that are not only sustainable but also evoke warmth and intimacy. This approach reconnects people with nature while redefining the boundaries of urban spaces. Throughout Kuma's projects, such as the Japan National Stadium and V&A Dundee in Scotland, Kuma has challenged modernist trends that overemphasize industrial materials like concrete. Instead, he advocates for lightness, transparency, and adaptability—values rooted in Japanese traditions that are also universally resonant.

Kuma pursues "openness and intimacy" in his designs, promoting structures that welcome their surroundings rather than dominate them. By combining traditional craftsmanship with modern technology, architecture can evolve into spaces that respect both cultural heritage and ecological systems.

In this lecture, Kuma invites architects, designers, and students to reconsider their roles in fostering a symbiotic relationship with nature. Together, we can craft a future where urban landscapes complement their natural contexts rather than compete with them.

Arts of Japan Starting May 11, 2024 **Museum of Fine Arts Boston**

The MFA has one of the most comprehensive collections of Japanese art anywhere in the world. Reimagined galleries explore Japan's art and visual culture from the 7th

century to today, including painting, sculpture, decorative arts, and selections from the Museum's vast collection of ukiyo-e prints. Evocative spaces include the renovated Japanese Buddhist Temple Room, which opened in 1909, and an adaptation of a traditional tea room, with tatami mats and an alcove. Multimedia displays illuminate performative art forms, such as Nō theater, bringing their drama to life.

The new space for the Museum's unparalleled Japanese collection—which was the first of its kind in America when established in 1890, and now holds about 100,000 objects—will change regularly, giving visitors the opportunity to see even more works in a setting that honors and celebrates Japan's rich history and cultural legacy.
